Soldier of the month:

PVT Benjamin Godleski 8th Infantry, 4th Infantry Division Apr 25, 1916 - Jun 15 (est) 1944

Benjamin Godleski of Edgewater NJ trained at Camp Gordon Johnston with the $4^{\rm th}$ Infantry Division in 1943. He landed on Utah Beach with the $4^{\rm th}$ on June 6, 1944. He was KIA in the French village of Montebourg. Benjamin's great nephew Joseph Puchalik III donated his story and photos to the museum this month. As we approach the $79^{\rm th}$ anniversary of the Normandy Invasion we are proud to honor his service and memory.

Featured artifact: This is a cloth survival map showing the currents and prevailing winds in and around the Philippines and Formosa. Issued by the Navy to both sailors and marines, this map was part of a survival kit. This artifact belonged to Capt. William John Lytle, USMC, who served on Guam and Saipan with the 4th Marine Air Wing. Donated by his daughter Mel Kelly, resident of Carrabelle and former mayor. The map is on display in our Marine Corps Exhibit.
